#### **Summary of 2015 Season**

1st XI: Brentham 1st team entered the 2015 season with plenty of hope following a strong showing in 2014. After a poor set of pre-season availability and results we entered the first League fixture with a tough game at home to Eastcote. Upon winning the toss and bowling first we started pretty well. New overseas recruit Scott Aufderheide picked up a couple of early wickets and went on to return a 6'fer on his League debut for the Club and Eastcote where bowled out for 226 in the last over of their innings. Ultimately the Brentham chase saw us end our innings on 196-5, securing a comfortable 4 points. Tom Brandreth played excellently for a maiden first team hundred.

Week 2 saw us travel to Wembley full of confidence. Unfortunately we lost an important toss and batted first. The Wembley wicket was very wet and all of our batters struggled to adapt their game, we were dismissed for 110 within 40 overs. Wembley started the chase in professional fashion with their openers digging in and valuing their wickets. This approach took them to 20 odd without loss before we picked up our first wicket. We continued to chip away at the wickets column, Scott again the standout, but Wembley just about got home for the win with just 2 wickets in hand. The game was very frustrating and a case of what might have been.

The next two weeks we had two home games, firstly against Hornsey then against Uxbridge. We gained 11 points from these two fixtures but in very different manner. Firstly against Hornsey we gained a point from a losing draw in a match that was dominated by their overseas player who scored 154\* out of their 231-4 dec. In reply Brentham ended up tamely scoring 134-7 having received more overs back than our opposition faced. The following home game against Uxbridge saw us bat in a totally different manner. Again our opponents batted first, this time scoring 261-7 having batted the full 55 overs. In what proved to be a brilliant chase we managed to win the game with one ball to spare. There were solid contributions from most of our batters but it took a special innings from Jaz Rehal to get us over the line, he ultimately ended 89\*.

Week 5 saw us travel to promotion hopefuls Brondesbury for a game that saw us claim just a single point. The match was very similar to the Hornsey fixture, where we were never really in the chase and ended our innings well short of their total but had dug in to secure something from the game. Game 6 saw Enfield travel to our Ground and they beat us heavily. Brentham batted first and were dismissed for 106 inside 40 overs; this team innings was very similar to Wembley earlier in the Season with a lack of concentration and ability seeing us being bowled out within 40 overs.

Enfield then proceeded to knock off the runs fairly easily in what was a disappointing day all round

Following the Enfield game I decided to leave myself out of the 1<sup>St</sup> XI and ultimately gave up the captaincy. It was a great honour to have been Brentham First Team Captain, even for such a short time. I must admit that I was finding cricket a struggle at the time, following the devastating passing of James Pettifer at the start of the Season. Along with this, I felt a lack of support from some elements of the side along with my own poor early Season form meant that leaving myself out of the side was the best thing to do. This report covers my time as Captain.

DANIEL SAGGERS - 1st XÍ CAPTAIN

With rain forecast across the day we knew when travelling to Acton that the toss was going to be an important factor in the outcome of the next Match. Unfortunately we lost that toss and after a steady start lost three quick wickets, which brought Luke and Matt together; they batted maturely managing to put on a 100 run partnership. This gave a much needed platform to the guys lower down the order to come in and express themselves, with some powerful hitting from both Glenn and Ravi, getting us up to 248-7 off 53 overs. In reply Acton got off to a decent start only to be faulted by Scott taking 2 wickets in 2 balls, removing their dangerous overseas player. This gave us the impetus to build some much needed pressure, restricting Acton to 103-4 when the rain finally came down and the Match had to be called off, Brentham attaining 4 points.

Brentham won the toss and chose to bat. After losing a couple of early wickets, Tom and Matt came together and managed to take the attack to the Bush attack putting on 111 for the 3rd wicket, only for Tom and then Matt to fall in quick succession. We managed to get to 193 off our 55 overs. In reply, as it had been for much of the Season, we failed to contain them and allowed the Bush to get off to a good start, being 52-0 off 10 overs. A superb effort from both Jaisreet and in particular Yogi rolling back the years managed to pull us back into the game, at one point had us thinking a positive result was certainly on the cards. A mixture of naivety from a young team without the killer instinct was our downfall meaning Bush got home with 4 balls to spare 8 wickets down.

As we reached the half way stage of the season, we travelled to Harrow St. Mary's. We lost the toss and were put into bat on a wet wicket. Tom and Ash got the team off to a promising start, playing patiently, seeing off the new ball and taking us to 109 before they both fell in quick succession. Having set our sights on 200, some good lower order hitting from Sam Cato, Glen & Ravi finally got us there after a shaky middle period threatened to

see us fall some way short of that target. Chasing just over 200 in 46 overs, HSM made a strong start, with their opener playing aggressively and scoring freely. However, as the game looked to be getting away from the Trees, Sam picked up a couple of quick wickets to bring the game into the balance. Despite a late burst from Scott and Matt, the HSM tail got over the line in the penultimate over, leaving the boys rueing missed opportunities. Whilst it was another defeat and no points to show for their efforts, the boys had performed well in large periods for two matches in a row. It was our failure to execute our skills under pressure, across all 3 facets of the game that was costing us the chance to take much needed points.

The second round of fixtures saw one of the worst performances of the season and the less said about it the better. We were stuck in, bowled out for 77 and had lost by 8 wickets after just 10 overs of the second innings. It was so disappointing to go from the two previous decent performances, to one that showed little or no fight at all with bat or ball.

When Wembley came to Meadvale Road, a win was even more important than a normal weekend as we knew they would be one of the sides attempting to avoid relegation. We were put in on a slow Brentham wicket, which was perfect for their bowling attack, consisting of medium pacers and spinners. It didn't take long for the Wembley executioner to get the ball talking but the openers stuck at the task well. Rather than the typical Brentham collapse we had seen over the season, we were able to develop several partnerships throughout the game but crucially not one of those managed to push on and make that big score. We ended up 173 all out in 54 overs, kicking ourselves knowing that 230/40 could have been achieved. Wembley scored 87 runs in the first 26 overs; we managed to pick up a couple of wickets, but always seemed one step behind the game. Wembley's middle order batted maturely scoring a further 87 runs in the last 14 overs faced, seeing them home with 5 overs to spare.

Next up was Hornsey away, which proved to be another game where we failed to put together a comprehensive batting and bowling performance. On this occasion it was the bowlers that did well, restricting Hornsey to 194-7 off 51 overs and giving the batters a good chance of grabbing some points. However, a batting display that was almost as bad as the Eastcote game quickly dashed any hopes as we collapsed embarrassingly, not for the first time.

Having got our only win of the Season from Uxbridge 9 weeks prior, the Team were hopeful that another 10 points were on the way. Having won the toss and elected to bowl we managed to bowl Uxbridge out for 190 off 49 overs on what looked a good batting track. Jaisreet was the pick of the

bowlers picking up a superb 5fer. Our chase got off to a nervy start with the top order failing to keep Ivor busy once again, leaving it up to the lower order. Enter Dylan Green, who it must be mentioned has played the majority of his cricket at Brentham in the 2s/3s, coming to the crease with us at 61-5 needing 132 from 31 overs. Ably supported by those in the lower order Dylan produced one of the most extraordinary innings. He showed great courage and application to hit 54 to see us home with 5 balls to spare, taking the broom approach to the Uxbridge left arm spinner sweeping him over the not so vacant cow corner boundary for a couple of large 6's. It really was a lesson for everyone in the first team on how to dig in and believe in your own ability.

The Bron were on a 7 game winning streak coming into the following weeks' game and when we turned up for the meet on the day of the game, it was easy to understand why, as they were already on the outfield warming up 2 hours prior to the game. We lost the toss again and were put in on a seamer friendly pitch, as ever we lost quick wickets with no real answer to the Bron bowling attack, only Sufian Sanick providing some resistance with a dogged 41. Chasing a low total of 94, Bron came out playing their shots, getting home in 19 overs 4 down – another game for us to move on and forget about.

Travelling to Enfield we knew exactly what to expect; having elected to bowl we managed to pick up 2 wickets in the first 2.5 overs with Scott and Matt hitting their straps from the start. However when the Enfield overseas player and their skipper came to the crease they took the game to us, with the overseas in particular showing great control to bat through the innings and score a 100. With a late flurry from the Enfield middle order they ended up 251-4 off 50 overs. In response our chase never seemed to get going despite the pitch being one of the better batting wickets we played on all year. Tommy showed some resistance at the top but again the middle order failed to produce runs of any substance. It took a partnership from Yogi and Jaisreet at the end to save the embarrassment of being bowled out for another score below 100, managing to get us up to 112 off 42 overs.

With 3 weeks left we welcomed Acton, another team flirting with relegation. They batted first and got off to a blistering start, putting on 149 for the first wicket. Following this woeful start we managed to slow down the run rate with more disciplined bowling throughout the middle overs restricting Acton to 246 off 50 overs. In reply we started well getting up to 54-1 off 10. However as with the trend of the year this was soon in jeopardy losing 3 quick wickets, bringing Luke and Matt to the crease who helped rebuild the innings somewhat bringing us up to 135-4. Feeling we were in a strong position, we pushed for the 4 points only to lose wickets at key times gifting

Acton the 10 points with an array of poor shot selection. This was a game which with a bit more composure and discipline would have ended in a positive result for us.

For the penultimate weekend of the season we headed to Bush, who we knew being top of the League would be a tough proposition and with a few key players away for the game we certainly found the going tough. On a decent batting track we were stuck in and bowled out for 97; Joe Brandreth the only positive light from an all-round dire batting display. To no surprise, Bush came out all guns blazing, chancing there arm from ball one, every shot they played came off and we were soon beaten convincingly in just 12 overs – the gap between top and bottom of the league was evident.

Going into the last game we wanted to try and salvage a bit of pride, having been relegated the previous week. In favourable bowling conditions Matt and Scott managed to make early inroads showing great discipline, and were ably supported by Jaisreet. Having restricted HSM to 174-7 in 53 overs, we managed to put together a solid batting performance with Luke and Matt putting on an 97 run partnership for the 4th wicket, helping us gain 4 points.

Overall a very disappointing Season in which we deserved to be relegated, only ourselves as players can help right the wrongs from this season to make sure we don't have the same result next year, in a Division that in recent times has proven to be a tough one to get out of. One positive was the fact that we had shown decent performances throughout the season with both bat and ball, the frustrating and crucial point being we couldn't bring these together in the same game.

MATT LOWEN - 1st XI Vice Captain

2<sup>nd</sup> XI: On the whole the 2's had an enjoyable season. Our aim at the start was promotion but with very poor availability throughout the season it was clear early on this would not happen. Only 6 players played more than 10 games: Hitch, James Diserens, ever present Paul Whelan, Jeevo, Mansi and myself.

Our first 3 League games were all eventful; a 3 run win against Perivale Phoenicians where Jamie Mansi took a match winning 7 for 30; a 15 run defeat with 9 men and a then 1 wicket win chasing 110 having been 27 for 7, with Bretto and Mansi seeing us home. We also had a great mid-season run with 4 wins out of 5 which was very encouraging. James Hitchcock was our outstanding batsman scoring 644 runs with important innings of 90 against Crouch End, including 126 not out against Perivale Phoenicians and 139 against Harrow Town. Jamie Mansi was our main wicket taker with 31 wickets which was twice as many as anyone else. Well done to

them both. Other encouraging performances were Paul Whelan's 119 against Birkbeck College and Peter McLaughlan's 7 for 48 against Perivale Phoenicians.

GRAEME OVERY - 2nd XI Captain

3rd XI: When I offered to serve as 3rd XI captain at a meeting in March, due to a lack of other options, did I realize how much that I would enjoy it, how much the players would enjoy it and quite how amazing some of the games were?

On the face of it, we just escaped relegation for the second year in a row, a situation that would have been a disaster and indeed it was close with our 4 points at Wembley in week 17 combined with other results going our way meaning that we would survive another season in MCCL.

There are however a lot of mitigating factors to all this. The number of colts and young players fielded by our 3rd XI was by far the most that we saw all season in any team. It is good news for the development of our lads and there were some excellent performances.

However, most of the time the younger players are disadvantaged playing

against men who are physically stronger and have much more experience and they have to try and think on their feet and get around the disadvantage. 15 year old wicketkeeper Aadil Khan was excellent all season after John Whelan at 52 years old was dropped to the twos!! Aadil is good enough to play in the twos next year and this is precisely why we have a third team. 17 year old Tom Barry put in some excellent spells opening the bowling and after some fantastic work with Chris Healey in the past year to help his action the rewards are being reaped. Some of his spells were quick but he needs to build his strength up to push on from his first full season. His outfielding was magnificent, saving many runs and he has an excellent arm from THE deep.

17 year old Alex Coutts was a throwback to the old days with his unbeaten 49\* in 52 overs in a batting shambles v Wembley; carrying his bat showed a great temperament and great skill. Alex fielding at home to Shepherds Bush was little short of sensational and he must have saved 25 runs at backward point, a magnificent effort and great to see.

Other excellent contributions from players 19 and under came from Matt Bunker jnr, Anmol Singh, Tirath Goane, Kiri, Harry Davies, Andrew Dickson, Peter McLaughlin, Azzy Butt, Dani Raza, and Vinmay Samtani.

At the other end of the scale we also had 7 over 50's playing this season, of which 6 played regularly and all made huge contributions. Mark Saggers, Tarig Khan, John Whelan, Colin Louison, Imran Raza and Chris Healey.

Chris was brilliant all Season and I thank him for it. His century combined with a hat trick at Kenton won the game for us when it was starting to look a little tricky after 8 dropped catches and we believe that this combination is a first for Brentham in League Cricket. Very well done Chris and thanks for all your help this season.

As you can see from this, we lack the 20-35 year old who can make a huge difference, apart from two players who had magnificent seasons. Donovan Pillay and Sohail ZiaButt.

Donovan's runs and wickets combined with wonderful fielding were worthy of a higher standing and he should have been playing in the Second team. The fact that he would not go there to play helped no one except the thirds, he certainly has the skill and knowledge to play there. His 7-10 against Ealing should have been enough for a win. Less said the better. In all he took 32 wickets including 4 5fers and scored 5 fifties.

Sohail ZiaButt scored two centuries, plenty of other scores over 50 and combined with his tight bowling at the top of the innings made him the 3rd team player of the year as he adapted brilliantly to his role. He also should have been playing in the twos but would not.

Saad Rehman also scored a century, making it 4 for the season in the 3rd XI as well as Gaff and PD both making 97 in a match, an incredible effort considering that on the whole the team batting and scores were very ordinary.

Bowling was excellent as we managed to bowl out 11 sides in the 18 games played and this would normally contribute more to the 5 games won.

Highlights of the season match wise include a crazy spell of matches around the turn of the season.

We went in week 9 to Richmond who were top of the Table at the time and it was quite an afternoon. Brentham won the toss and decided to bowl despite only having 8 at the ground with one player late fresh from having a haircut, one player late, fresh from getting his kit dried after his Mrs had washed it that morning and one player who was on his way after working until midday.

If it was the right thing to field first with 11 then it was right to field first despite the fact that 2 of the players missing were our opening bowling attack.

With two drink breaks arranged for 20 and 35 overs with a 12:30 start, we had the first drink break at 1.18 with Richmond 68-0. The bowling was opened by the captain and the returning Peter McLaughlin and when those two had finished, Chris Healey and Donovan in freshly laundered kit managed in the next 15 overs to take 6-22 in 40 minutes. Four paces was the longest run up on show.

Richmond eventually were all out in 45 overs in well under two hours and they frankly were stunned by the whole event. Even better when Nish Patel had a eureka moment in the car on the way over to the game and decided that he was not going to scratch around waiting for the ball with his name on any more and decided to run down the wicket on a spicy deck and smash the bowling around.

Brentham won by 6 wickets with a combination of right hand batting, left hand batting as well as switch hits and that was all from Sohail who caused utter chaos in the game. A great win.

The following week a much changed side went to bottom of the table Winchmore Hill who at the time had amassed 3 points in the first 9 matches. On another very hot day the Hill launched a blitzkrieg of shots unrivalled anywhere that season.

They had 12 off the first over, 70 off 7 during which time we had used 4 bowlers, 110 off 10 and they were just warming up. Every shot came off, half chances were missed and fielders started going missing as the afternoon wore on.

A barely credible 308-6 off 48 overs including 2 run outs and they declared. However, we had a plan. Chris Healey and I said to the lads that it was only 6 an over, have a go and we will see where we are at different points in the game.

Not bad at 100-3 off 20 with good early batting and then the most incredible partnership of 191 for the 4th wicket between Sohail (100) and PD (97) propelled the score to 302-4 off 48, 7 to win, 6 wickets in hand and 4 overs to get them.

On comes a very part time leg spinner for his first bowl of the afternoon in over number 50 to lob a few up to finish the match off. A wicket first ball, then two run outs, stunning cricket and the crowd had now grown to large proportions and the world seem to be slowing down in its rotation.

4 to win, last over 3 wickets in hand, crowd now raucous. Leggie decided it was good fun and had another go.

Dot, wicket, one, dot, wicket. Not Morse code but the clatter of timber.

Out strides the captain to be the non-striker off the last ball of the match with all results possible.

A quick conversation with the facing batsman was finished with "pat it back we will take a point here"

Field up, the leggie tossed it up from his 6' 6" frame and the captain was seen with horror on his face as, in slow motion, the facing batsman decided to twirl the bat in his hand mid-flight and attempt a reverse sweep.

It did not go well, he missed the straight one (they were all straight) and off the last ball of the match lbw to lose the game by two runs. After being 302-4, chasing 309 to win. Three wickets in the last over and the part time leggie ends up with 4-2. The captain was last seen on his haunches with Tariq as umpire apologizing for having to give him out, with scenes going on all round them.

We also believe that this is the first time in the MCCL for Brentham that both sides had scored over 300. Scant consolation for what should have been one of the best chases at Club level.

The match the week after where we lost by one wicket just paled into the season where we could have done so much better.

A brilliant win by 9 wickets against the Bush chasing 154 to win featured an amazing century by Saad Rehman. The Bush and representatives from Harrow where we played that day both said well done and they were genuinely pleased for us, both of them clubs having good words for us.

It is a pity that we get more respect from the cricket world than we do from within our own Club and own four walls.

We had umpires in 16 of 18 games, a great help and a very high standard. So very many thanks to both Aishah Khan and Harris Lambi.

Probably the moment of the season was when I tossed up in the match at home to Wycombe House and I told them we had an umpire and as they didn't have one, did they want her to umpire both ends??? The captain's first question was "is she fair??"

All in all we used 43 players this season. 43. A stunning amount which meant two or more new players every week. No team can manage to build anything with that turnover but I fully understand we get what we get given. A reminder for ones and twos players who do not play is that we suffer your loss as well as the team that you play in as players have to go up to cover your position. Please think of that for 2016.

My last point is that I must have been playing the wrong game for the past 40 years or so. Some of the shots and players this year at 3rd XI were quite amazing. The standard was extremely high in some games but it turns out that some Clubs had plenty of overseas players and they found themselves in the 3's and some Clubs loaded better players in the 3's from higher sides to save relegation.

The MCCL send out a memo about the last couple of games where teams have to be picked on merit. What about the previous 16??? Kenton were very poor against us twice and they had an incredible end of season, easily escaping relegation that seemed theirs all season. Sadly, Winchmore Hill went down who beat us in the thriller and with their cricket philosophy they deserved a whole lot better. A very enjoyable season with some of the most amazing cricket that I have played in 40 years.

MARK SAGGERS - 3rd XI Captain

4th XI: The 4s had a tough outing in the Middlesex Championship Division 3 for 1st XIs. We had to be registered as a 1st XI due to administrational constraints with the League. We expected it to be a hard grind given we had submitted a 4th XI into a jungle of 1st XI mercenaries.

We won one game, gathered a winning draw and sixteen losses, which included a losing streak for the record books.

One of the biggest reasons we had such a season is because our youthful batting could not click most of the time. However, experienced individuals put their hands up to show opposition just how it's done on the battlegrounds of Durston House playing fields. These included; with a few solid not-outs to his name while opening, Brendon McCann helped anchor the innings when the rest of the team started collapsing on a regular basis. Afzal Butt acquired a glittering 49\* but could not reach one more run with me at the other end perishing cheaply,(regretting that to this day). Saad Rehman also added a fifty and a robust 90 to his collection of knocks this season before moving up to the 3s.

The 4th XI bowling had a few regulars who also stood up and tried to fight when the batting didn't click. Afzal, a bully with the bat, also bulldozed his way to our only win of the season and a six wicket haul. Atif Shah, in his brief stint with the 4th XI, picked up quite a few 3 wicket hauls at Durston House proving to be lethal with his unweaning offspin. Sam Pankanti chipped in to the wicket tally on a consistent basis,

Haseeb Satarzay and James Perkins proved to be great utilities to the team with both bat and ball. Highlights including a stunning six over a canal near the Tower Hamlets ground from Haseeb and the numerous sublime cameos from a prime James with the blade.

Most of the time we had quite a young side. Despite this, with the help of seniors, they battled opposition of much higher calibre for which we were never prepared for and gave them a good fight. Our initial skipper, Saad Rehman had a glorious stroke of form in the last few games of the season. This resulted in his services being deployed to the 3s and catapulting myself to the helm. In the flux, we also had Riyaaz Kasmaani take over captaincy for three games.

During the last game of the season, all of us wanted to finish on a positive note. We played our home game away at South Harrow because our lease with Durston House had ran out but our Team Secretary managed to get their ground in time on Friday. Having put in the opposition to bat first, we restricted them to 245/7 (55 overs), In reply, we secured a winning draw with a destructive display of sweeping from Usama Siddiqi who garnered a quick 140 and got us just two runs away from victory. The result came as a

bright send-off to an otherwise hard season.

We did not have a constant Team for most of the season due to either a lack of availabilities or talented players getting promoted to the 3s or higher. However, under all the shuffling, there is a wealth of talent for Brentham CC to bank on in the years to come. I hope the 4s do well because a huge well of success is impending for them over the horizon where a different League awaits.

5<sup>th</sup> XI: Our 5th XI had a tough time getting started. With many of our younger players away at University and completing exams, we struggled for numbers at the beginning of the season. Even when we did have a team out we found it difficult to compete in a League just one Division below our 2nd XI with a hugely inexperienced squad.

In a season filled with blinking lights in the loss column, we did come away with one exceptional win against Peshwa – a team GWR have failed to beat in the last five seasons and some stand out performances from younger players.

Badar, a regular nuisance, also found his usefulness as a bowler, consistently breaking partnerships and bamboozling batsmen with his slow meandering deliveries.

This was a tough season for the captain and the team, but it gave younger players the chance to shine and take responsibility. We may not have a

So, year one in charge of Brentham Colts and there's just the small matter of a merger to deal with – it's never quiet, is it? A season that had potential to present a huge number of issues and problems actually ended up being a comparatively smooth one, helped in no small part by a number of ever willing helpers:

- Jack Solomon seemed to spend almost every night at the Club coaching before taking on captaincy of the Under-19s and volunteering himself as Development League captain.
- Chris Healey did great work as ever with the Under-17s, getting out a competitive side at the hardest age group for availability was no-mean feat at all, and was a great asset to the Under-11s in the second-half of the season.
- Richard Taper took responsibility for the Under-11s for the early parts of the season and has taken over the Clubmark running of the section which is a huge task to oversee.
- PD coped with running three sides in the Under-12 and Under-13 age group, spending three or four nights a week at the Club, and his Club nights and parents and kids games were superb social occasions that went down brilliantly with all concerned.
- Scott did a fantastic job when it came to one-to-ones and the summer school. The summer school is an absolute must moving forward. Scott and Mark did a fine job getting it up and running this summer to the extent that we were turning parents away such was its popularity but it is crucial that this is nailed down in the Colts' season.
- Mark Saggers and Matt Bunker ran the important and very popular Sunday morning Under-10 sessions and ensured they keep running smoothly no matter what the weather.

In terms of the merger it would be fair to say that the numbers of new members was, thankfully, lower than expected and, with the number of new coaches who joined, our kids to coach ratio got better. This definitely made the season less stressful and meant that more of us spent less time at the Club over the course of the summer. The quality of new members from GWR was, on the whole, strong and they made good progress over the season. I would say that any GWR and Brentham split seemed to dissolve over the course of the summer and that the GWR parents and players enjoyed their first season with us.

The undoubted positive from this season would be getting 5 players into the Borough Squad ahead of the start of the season. Two of those left ahead of the new season (one to Acton and you can guess where the other one went) but of the three that stayed, two made it through to the Regional Squad (one below County). All three of the Borough/Regional squad players are in the Under-13s next season.

We still have an awful long way to go to get to where we want to be but it would be fair to say that we are off life-support but still in intensive care. We are still at the mercy of our better colts being 'persuaded' to play their cricket elsewhere and at the lower age group the players we get in at Under-10 and below are very raw.

We could always do with more help from the Senior players within the Club. Help doesn't have to be committing to every Wednesday night for the summer, help is doing a couple of hours one Sunday before the season with our winter nets, doing one Sunday morning with the Under-10s in the summer or helping us to run an event. You would be amazed how much one extra pair of hands helps at a session and seeing a Senior member of the club working with the colts is always well received by the parents and the kids.

Work is already underway for next season regarding coaching courses, winter nets and, hopefully, more primary school/secondary school work. Getting into schools is the most important thing that we have to do to secure the medium term progression of the colts. Unfortunately due to the age and work situation of our coaches going into schools is not something that is particularly feasible for many of us. We are investigating routes such as Chance to Shine and other alternatives to get our names into schools such as running competitions, taster sessions etc but this is a project which needs detailed and focussed plans.

(And that's with two regular players lost to pre-season to injury). 13 U17 players also made at least one Senior appearance at weekends.

On the field we played ok, although League results were disappointing - we won only 1 out of 5. But we were competitive every time, losing close games against Wembley, Old A's and last year's champions Osterley. (The latter was particularly annoying - two very late and unreasonable pullouts meant we took 9 players, and still only lost by 2 wickets). The Ealing game looked hopeful when they were 60-5, but after our captain concussed himself and we went down to 10 men, the game got away from us and we lost 160/120. Still, plenty of reason for optimism about this group.

#### **JAMES PETTIFER**

The joy of being associated with Brentham Cricket Club was severely dimmed by the news of the sudden and premature death of one of its greatest assets, JAMES PETTIFER in April last year.

James joined Brentham as a colt after leaving Ealing CC and in the ensuing years became a vital part of the Club, very popular both with his team mates and the opposition. This popularity was born of James' willingness to play the game in the almost old fashioned way of playing hard but fair, always enjoying a joke with both the umpire and the opposition, not only on the pitch but also afterwards in the bar. He was also among the first to volunteer his services for any functions or work parties that the club arranged.

James truly enjoyed his many roles for Brentham which included, 2nd team captain, 2nd team vice-captain, fixture secretary, team secretary and coaching colts. This last role was one he was eminently suited to, his training as a teacher enabling him to pass on the knowledge he had been taught as a colt himself and also his experiences gained as a player rising through the senior sides.

On the field of play James was a steady off-spinner, left-handed batsman and by his own admission an 'enthusiastic' fielder. These are the bare bones of James's game.

The flesh was that he could be relied on to come on and bowl accurate spells, perhaps not turning the ball greatly, that yielded a constant stream of wickets every season.

It was only in the last couple of seasons that James finally realised the potential he had as a batsman. Playing several successful brave rearguard innings gave him the confidence to take his batting more seriously and we saw some of the sweetly timed shots he was capable of.

Away from cricket James, the most gregarious of people, liked nothing more than the company of his teammates, a pint and a kebab (not always in that order) and revelled in his nickname of 147. Lately he had found love with Helen, gained a good position in his School and it seemed that life was set fair for him.

His tragic loss has robbed the Club of someone whose DNA had Brentham written through it and we will miss him and his insane laugh more than we can say.

#### JAMES PETTIFER MEMORIAL MATCH BRENTHAM CC V EALING CC - 23 AUGUST 2015

With the blessing of the Charlie, Loretta, Michael, Ryan and Helen, this memorial match in honour of James was arranged between two of the most prominent sides in James' cricketing career, Brentham CC and Ealing CC. The sides contained players from many Middlesex League sides, a testament to James' popularity.

Most things in this country are coloured by the weather and, as the players and supporters gathered, the rain came down progressively getting heavier as the 1pm start time approached. However, James was ever present that day as miraculously the clouds parted, the sun came out and by 2 pm we were able to start proceedings. David Bloomfield dedicated the day, the cricket got under way and the sun shone for the afternoon.

The sunshine was mirrored by the extraordinary number of people that came to the ground to make it the occasion that James deserved. Streams of family, friends, cricketing acquaintances and pupils and teachers from his School flowed around the ground meeting James's family and swapping tales about James and his approach to cricket and his life. The numbers were in the hundreds from all walks of James' life. It was heartwarming to find that pupils, who had been taught by James, arrived early to play their part in the day; they were later joined by their Head Teacher. The game was dominated by Luke Budden who scored a magnificent unbeaten 124. The home side totalled 233-4 in the 35 overs allocated to each side and Ealing responded with 197-7 much bolstered by 47 from James Overy, making a guest appearance.

During the afternoon a collection was organised for the Pettifer families chosen charity CRY. In addition, the BBQ & Drinks Tent made over £500 which was also given to Charlie and Loretta for their chosen charity but the family wanted these monies to be used by (i) buying a Memorial Bonus Ball number for James and for winnings go to CRY; (ii) buy 2 red roses for the garden at Brentham CC; one in memory of James and one in memory of Roger Kingdon, with the balance monies going to Brentham CC Colts – which was a wonderful desture.

Immediately following the game the sides and all spectators gathered together to pay their formal respects to James and his family and were addressed by Rajiv Patel. It had been a splendid and suitable occasion to honour a young but central figure to the Club and matters were concluded by The President, who thanked the players from Ealing, who had enabled the occasion to be a proper memorial for James Pettifer, who had loved Brentham and Brentham had loved him.



#### All Members and Guests of Brentham CC will:

- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person within the context of Cricket
- Treat everyone equally and not discriminate on the grounds of age, gender, disability, race, ethnic origin, nationality, colour, parental or marital status, religious belief, class or social background, sexual preference or political belief
- Not condone, or allow to go unchallenged, any form of discrimination if witnessed
- Display high standards of behaviour
- Promote the positive aspects of Cricket e.g. fair play
- Encourage all participants to learn the Laws and rules and play within them, respecting the decisions of match officials
- Actively discourage unfair play, rule violations and arguing with match officials
- Recognise good performance not just match results
- Place the well-being and safety of Young People above the development of performance
- Ensure that activities are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of the individual
- Respect Young People's opinions when making decisions about their participation in Cricket
- Not smoke, drink or use banned substances whilst actively working with Young People in the Club.
- Not provide Young People with alcohol when they are under the care of the Club
- Follow ECB guidelines set out in the "Safe Hands Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children' and any other relevant guidelines issued
- Report any concerns in relation to a Young Person, following reporting procedures laid down by the ECB
- In addition to the above, all Club Officers and Appointed Volunteers will:
- Hold relevant qualifications and be covered by appropriate insurance

- Always work in an open environment (i.e. avoid private or unobserved situations and encourage an open environment)
- Inform Players and Parents of the requirements of Cricket


