Summary of 2013 Season

1st XI: It was all change for the 1st XI in the 2013 season. With the resignation of Vish Sethi as first team captain and nine first team players leaving, it was imperative the remaining senior players stepped up and ensured we maintained our status in Division 2 – this year's target.

The first game of the season, Harrow Town at home, was already being labelled 'Survival Saturday' as it was deemed essential we gain a positive result against a team traditionally in the lower half of the league come September. Pleasingly Ashwin Kapoor really stepped up, hitting a magnificent 145*; Brentham's first non-overseas hundred since Keith Dutch. Ash was ably supported by Vish Sethi and Luke Budden, this enabled us to declare on 280-2 off 47 overs in a rain affected match. Harrow Town finished on 178-2 in response and we picked up an important winning draw. Much of the bowling effort was down to Jaisreet Bajwa who bowled a very tidy, miserly spell of off-spin and picked up our two wickets.

Following this encouraging start to the season we travelled to newly promoted Harrow St Mary's. Having lost the toss (again) we batted first and were indebted to Ash (62) and Vish (73) who put on 130 for the opening stand. This was to prove crucial as we eventually declared on 190-8 from 51 overs after a late flurry of wickets. Ash and Vish had made a mockery of what was a 'fruity' pitch and we felt confident that we had more than enough runs on the board. This was to prove the case as Matt Lowen ran through their batting with his first 5-fer of the season. Tim Duncraft picked up his first league wickets for the club and Jaisreet came on to finish the job off.

Next up were Brondesbury, fresh from their relegation and keen to prove that they had adapted to bowling teams in 50 overs (apparently this was to be their biggest challenge). Brondesbury were to get the opportunity to prove this was the case as they batted first. Ex-Brentham player James Overy scored a composed and confident hundred to take Brondesbury up to 221-9. Tim picked up four wickets and two run outs while Jaisreet bowled particularly well, earning himself three wickets with an economy of under three in 17 overs. The chase didn't start well when Ash was out for a duck and Nish Patel fell cheaply too. However, Jaz Rehal rose to the challenge and scored an entertaining 67 after a somewhat shaky start. When he departed it was left to Luke and Matt to see the team through. That was until the classic Brentham collapse as 154-3 became 155-7! We did manage to block out the last couple of overs to remain unbeaten.

Newly promoted teams came thick and fast at this stage of the season as we welcomed Uxbridge to Meadvale Road. On a wet wicket runs would always be hard to come by and Uxbridge bowled well, picking up four wickets quickly. The fifth wicket stand between Matt and Danny Siggers proved to be match-defining as they added 62 runs in tricky conditions. When Danny was out for 24 it was left to Matt to guide the team to a respectable total. He brought up his 50 and then departed, last man out, and we had amassed 105. Despite Uxbridge getting off to a good start (20-0), the ball was doing plenty and Tim and Matt were putting enough balls in the right areas. After the first wicket, they fell in a great flurry, the boys reducing Uxbridge to 54-8. This merely set the stage for another ex-Brentham player: Sully Mughal. He batted carefully (!) and sensibly (!!) to take Uxbridge within 14 runs of victory before Yogesh (Yogi) Prabhu forced him to play onto his own stumps. We took the last wicket (a run out) with Uxbridge needing eight runs to win and were celebrating before the umpire had even raised his finger. Matt picked up another 5-fer and Nish Patel was the cool head who brought about the key run-out. This win put us top of the league, a surprising position after much pre-season doom and gloom.

The following week we played Southgate (away) and Ash continued his fine start to the season, scoring a well-paced century. The returning Paul Siggers scored his first fifty of the season and Matt continued his form with the bat, scoring 42. Although these three contributed over 190, as a team we could only muster 214. In response, we bowled and fielded pretty poorly and never got on top of the Southgate batters at all. Their overseas player scored an imperious 72* and controlled their chase expertly. Our first defeat of the season.

We had the perfect opportunity to get back on track against bottom of the table Ickenham the week after. On another rain-affected day Ickenham bizarrely decided to bat for 55 overs even though the match had been reduced to an 82 overs game. Once again the opposition's overseas player batted well, this time bringing up his century in the final over. Our chase for four points never got started and we ended 80-8 and being grateful for the losing draw.

The rain continued to fall and affected our next match, away at Harrow. After winning the toss and inserting Harrow we struck early and often, predominantly through Matt. At the other end Tim played the perfect foil, his 15 overs going for only 17 runs. The expert death-bowling of Yogi, who picked up 3 wickets, reduced Harrow to 92.

With conditions favouring the bowlers and Harrow possessing two of the top wicket takers in the league, this was going to be no stroll in the park. So it was proved as we lost two cheap wickets. Luke and the returning Joe Brandreth went about rebuilding the innings, but when both of these fell, followed by Vish and Finn Grist, the game could have gone either way. Once again, Matt (28*) played a mature knock and with Neel Gandhi (11*) managed to guide us home with a couple of overs to spare.

Our last two matches of the first half of the season we disappointing performances against high-flying Shepherds Bush and North Middlesex. We lost by 10 wickets and 7 wickets respectively, with not many positives being taken from either game.

The second half started with the boys knowing that we needed to put in some strong performances. This was helped with many university and exam students returning to help bolster the team.

We travelled to relegation-threatened Harrow Town confident of putting in a strong performance. Tim and Matt started well with the ball as we reduced the oppo to 75-5. This coincided with our opening bowlers tiring and the Harrow Town batters capitalised, taking their total up to 248, with their number 9 scoring fifty and number 10 scoring 27. Tom Brandreth and Ash got us off to a storming start as they crashed the ball all around the ground. However, as soon as Tom fell, we could not build a partnership of any significance. Wickets tumbled and when James Pettifer was bowled, playing 14 minutes too late, it was left to Tim and Luke to block out 15 overs for the draw.

Having started the season well, we were in danger of being dragged into a relegation battle. The home match against Harrow St Mary's presented us with the chance to gain a much-needed ten points. We started well with the ball and picked up early wickets. However, their skipper dug in and scored a slow fifty (only four runs in front of square!). When he departed we were unable to finish the job off as many of their lower order contributed to their total of 194. We were seriously struggling at 61-5 before Tom and Luke added 88 for the sixth wicket. While trying to up the run-rate Luke fell for 47 and our hopes rested with Tom. Unfortunately, he perished for 93 as the run-rate increased and we took the four points.

An interesting game against Brondesbury followed. We batted first and compiled 204-9, with our last wicket falling in the final over. Tom, Ash and extras had got us off to a great start, but after Tom was out wickets fell in quick succession and we did well to bat through the overs. In response, Brondesbury got off to a flying start.

With rain imminent and the light fading we picked up their two openers who tried to move their scoring rate along. This brought their Middlesex batter in who looked up at the sky and decided to tuck into Yogi's half-trackers. Four consecutive sixes were struck into the tennis courts off long hops, Yogi had not listened to his captain's desperate plea to "land it in his half". As the clouds continued to gather, players could not see ten yards in front of them and when Joe was almost taken out at deep extra from a cover drive the umpires wisely decided to call it a day with Brondesbury 16 runs short of their target. The less said about the actions of one of their senior players the better...

We travelled to Uxbridge knowing that we could do the double over them for the year and go some way to retaining Division 2 status for another season. We got off to the perfect start with Matt bowling a wicket maiden. He continued to bowl superbly in his best spell of the season (17-8-24-3). Tim, too, found some rhythm until their overseas player started running down the wicket at everything he bowled. Once again the introduction of Jaisreet helped to swing the game in our favour. With Matt bowling maidens from one end, Jaisreet's end was targeted. This was always going to be dangerous as he picked up the key wicket of their overseas and a run-out in the space of three balls. We were determined not to let their lower order increase their total and Yogi bowled superbly, picking up the final three wickets to dismiss Uxbridge for 118. Their overseas player opened the bowling and quickly had us 17-3. Joe and Matt then batted very sensibly to take us towards the total. Unfortunately, Joe was run-out (backing up too far) with the finish line in sight and it was left to Neel to accompany Matt (49*) over the line. This was our best performance in the field all season, with superb ground fielding and a number of high-quality catches.

With confidence high we welcomed Southgate to Meadvale Road, keen to exact some revenge for earlier in the season. Batting first, we scored 217 with five batters all contributing 20 or more to the score but none of them passing 50. This meant we were constantly checked when trying to increase the run-rate. However, a similar bowling and fielding performance to the week before would give us a great opportunity for back-to-back ten points. When Tim dismissed their overseas player in his first over with an athletic caught and bowled we already felt their chance of the win had gone. From then on we bowled and field very well, cutting off singles and preventing boundaries. At drinks Southgate required five an over with eight wickets in hand to gain four points.

They never even got close as we picked up wickets regularly, leaving one of their openers to block the last seven overs and prevent some well deserved retribution.

The batters were raring to go at our next match, away at Ickenham. On a tiny ground against a team in the bottom two our batters were confident of cashing in. Unfortunately, this confidence got in the way of actually building an innings and we were soon 66-5 and 116-7. However, Jaz and Tim showed the top-order batters how to construct an innings as both passed fifty after taking their time to set themselves. Some lusty blows late on from Tim and ultimate dead-batting from Yogi took us above 200. With the ball swinging Matt and Tim repeatedly beat the bat, Matt in particular was unlucky: beating the bat five times in a row before being hit over his head for six...twice! Their captain swung at everything and somehow scored a fifty, their other opener scored a far more classy 96*. Jaisreet, again, bowled well, picking up two wickets. However, a combination of rain, bad light and a lack of sawdust saw the umpires take us off before Ickenham had the chance to secure what would have been a well-deserved win. With all games being rained off the following week we had secured safety.

The penultimate game of the season was us travel to Shepherds Bush who had only picked up eight points in their previous eight games (rumour had it) and were still not safe. The first ball of the game did not bode well as Tom clipped a leg-stump full-toss straight to square leg: 0-1. This soon became 42-8 when Ravi Patel strolled nonchalantly to the crease to accompany Matt. These two added 60 before Matt fell. This did not hinder Ravi who eventually fell for 47 (or was it 46?) in the final over, just short of a well-deserved maiden 50. Despite the Bush getting off to a good start we managed to claw things back with Jaisreet picking up four wickets. They eventually won by three wickets but it was great to see the boys showing some fight. We lost the last game of the season to champions North Middlesex by seven wickets.

In a season of ups and downs we achieved our primary target of avoiding relegation. We fielded incredibly young and inexperienced teams throughout the season, with a number of players making their 1st XI League debuts. We played brilliantly in a number of games; defending 102 against Uxbridge at home was a particular highlight. There were also a number of poor performances; players really need to take training and their own development more seriously during the week. On the batting front, the team were indebted to Ashwin Kapoor (527 runs, including two centuries); Luke Budden (433 runs) and Matt

Lowen (342 runs) who scored the majority of runs. The bowling was dominated by Matt Lowen (36 wickets from 224 overs); Jaisreet Bajwa (27 wickets from 159 overs) and Tim Duncraft (18 wickets from 212 overs). We only bowled seven players all season and no other bowler even bowled 36 overs. Next season we need to see more contributions throughout the team whether it's with the bat or ball in hand or in the field.

As always a HUGE thank you to Ivor Chaplin for his unstinting work as scorer – he really does an unbelievable job. Also, to the committee who have supported the team in a tricky year and everyone who has come down to support the team, home and away – your presence and wise words are always much appreciated.

On a personal note, thanks to all the players who have put up with me throughout the season in my first year as captain, I'll try to be nicer and calmer next year...

2nd XI: The 2013 season was a disappointing season seeing the second eleven relegated to the 3rd division of the MCCCL. Heading into the last game of the season at Hornsey we had given ourselves a good chance to stay in the division. This was quite a remarkable situation considering we did not win a league game until the 9th week.

There is not a lot of cheer report from the first 8 games as the second eleven only claimed 2 points from rained off fixtures at Wembley and Indian Gymkhana. However the loss to Barnes at home in week 7 was difficult to take. After bowling Barnes out for 146 (Pettifer 6 for 38), in true Brentham fashion in we reply we found ourselves 35 for 7 but ended up 20 runs short.

Once availability improved through the club, the second team started to see a change in fortunes, which started against Hornsey at home. Batting first against the league leaders, we posted 229 all out and bowled them out in the penultimate over for 183. A big congratulations to Peter McLaughlin as he took his first senior 5fer.

Back to back wins took the trees out of the relegation zone against Wembley at home. Again batting first (this became a common theme towards the back end of the season), Brentham posted 233 with Daniel Saggars and Imran Hamidon scoring 50s. Wembley were bowled out for 162 in 42 overs with Sunil Sodhi taking his first 5 wicket haul for the club.

The use of 3 slow bowlers proved an important asset during this period of the season. The old ball was taken on many occasions and

used effectively. The next game is a real choker as we played promotion chasing Twickenham away. Brentham continued to set a total 234 with James Hitchcock scoring an impressive 65. The highlight of our innings for some people took place in the 12th over, when our left handed opening batsman was hit flush in the head by a bouncer delivered by the Twickenham opening bowler. In reply Brentham were disciplined with their bowling and fielding, Twickenham at this stage were 150 for 9. Pettifer and McLaughlin bowled 38 out of the 45 overs in reply taking 4 wickets each. The last wicket partnership put on 48 to claim the winning draw. We had our chances but failed to take them.

The next game was Brondesbury, which was very similar to the previous week but the rain came around 6pm with the opposition 160 for 6 chasing 240, all results were possible. A disappointing end to a game that could have gone to the wire, a losing draw.

The next two games saw us take 11 points with a win at home against Indian Gymkhana in a low scoring game. Ciaran Brett showing why he is a sultan of swing with an important 4 wicket haul in our victory. At one stage Indian Gymkhana in reply were 0 for 2 off 0.2 overs and both wickets caught behind the stumps! The Barnes fixture away the following week was rained off.

We now come to one of the most famous victories Brentham second team have achieved in recent memory. Brentham posted an important 190 off 53 overs with a last wicket partnership of 45 between James Pettifer and new recruit Alex Brown. Brentham collected an important wicket in the first over and by drinks the game was evenly poised with Shepherds Bush 80 for 4. Brentham continued to take wickets straight after the interval with the visitors 130 for 6, however this Shepherds Bush side had a lot of experience with five ex first team captains in the side. Enter Carl Menzie who steadied the ship and looked to guide the Bush to victory. With 4 overs to go the visitors needed 16 runs with 4 wickets in hand. Before you knew it 3 wickets were taken in 3 overs meaning the game went into the last over. The Bush now needed 5 to win while Brentham needed one wicket. 147 delivered a cleverly flighted full toss on leg stump which their number nine batsman chipped it up to Sahil Patel at Mid On who held onto the catch. This saw jubilant scenes on the Brentham square with the president watching on.

With Harrow only taking a point in the penultimate week it meant that victory in the last game of the season guaranteed safety for the trees. However a fairy tale ending to the season was not the case.

On a wet wicket Brentham were bowled out for 71 with some average shot selection. In reply Hornsey knocked off the total 2 down in 22 overs to become champions of the division. With Twickenham unable to do us a favour at Harrow, our relegation was confirmed by 7pm on the final league Saturday of the season.

Many thanks to the ever present John Capps, who stood as our umpire in each fixture. Here's hoping that's the second team can challenge for promotion out of division three next summer.

Luckily, Brentham had the coolest man in W5 as Joe hit a stunning extra cover drive for four and thus took the Final into a super over.

(Wisden has since taken down his name as the only living cricketer to get a 3-ball duck in a super over). Tim's demise brought Matt to the crease who managed a single to give the strike to the man of the moment and needing 4 to win off the last ball Joe once again crashed a cover drive for four and much to the jubilation of the crowd won the game for the Brentham side.

Conclusions from the day's festivities: James Pettifer should never have a microphone in his hand and for future Club fundraising Events make sure Dilesh Patel is present with a beer in his hand! I mention this as Dilesh made a donation of £5 for every six which was hit throughout the day. Obituaries

ROGER F KINGDON - LIFE VICE PRESIDENT 1952 - 2014

The announcement that Roger had suffered serious head injuries from a fall at Brentham Club and his death some days later without regaining consciousness was followed by messages of concern and sympathy from far and wide.

Roger was one of the outstanding batsmen of his era, which was probably not appreciated fully by those who came to know him after his playing days. He also became a major and well-known figure both at Brentham and in Club Cricket circles. In his youth a rotund and unathletic figure tended to hide a serious player and a most talented one.

The aneurism he suffered when he was only 29 left him partially paralysed and brought an untimely end to his playing days. It was also a major blow to Brentham as he had proved to be the natural leader of his period. He became Captain of the Club in 1976 until 1978 and it was planned that he would return again after a break. It was not to be.

Despite his physical handicap, about which he was never heard to complain, Roger continued to pursue his interest in club cricket and Brentham in particular. He had many friends in many Clubs and was an example of how there was more to cricket than just the game itself. He enjoyed the social scene and was always convivial company. He typified what could be gained from ensuring that there was inter action between clubs and players. Over the years he suffered falls, blackouts and other reactions but he was always looked after by his family of friends. He maintained the respect of his contemporaries and continued to apply sharp analytical assessments of matches as well the wider scene.

As a player and a captain he was determined that the game should be played competitively but also in the proper way. The spirit of cricket was one of his high priorities. He had little time for those who sought to win at all costs, without considering the greater damage they were actually doing. He was not amused by the growing tendency to put sides in and then defend rather than seek to bowl sides out.

Such was his foresight that he proposed to the League over 20 years ago that the points for a draw should be amended to take account of this trend. It was ignored but now the tendency has become practice. He should have been listened to.

Roger came to Brentham in 1970 at the age of 18 when he had already created high expectations as an opening batsman. He was part of a group of young people, including Nick Vincent, Alan Holley, Ken Smale and Bob Procter, who had attended St Clement Danes School and came under the cricketing influence of Russ Collins. Roger immediately made his mark by compiling over a 1,000 runs (not a common occurrence at Brentham) at an average of 34.35 in his first season. He proceeded to repeat this performance for the next 8 seasons, always averaging in the high 30s. His aggregate in his 11 seasons was 12,130 runs at an average of 32.4 and in the League alone 3,045 at 31.39. He recorded 6 centuries but more particularly took part in partnerships of over a hundred on 26 occasions, 4 of which were with Graham Barlow and 2 with Michael James. Another notable achievement was his stand of over 150 with Nick Vincent.

Bowling is not something that would be associated with Roger but he occasionally was called upon to produce his off spinners. They were more than tidy and he took 212 wickets at a commendable average of 21.73. He would have been particularly proud of his success against High Wycombe in 1974 when he took 6 wickets for 28 runs having previously scored 71. In addition, he is credited with 146 catches and (surprisingly) 3 stumpings.

Outside of Brentham, Roger was heavily involved both in his playing days and afterwards with the Thames Valley Gentlemen, for whom he fulfilled a central administrative role, and with the Buckinghamshire Cavaliers. He was ever present on the Tours whether it was the annual ones to Sussex and Kent or to Devon, which he was instrumental in inaugurating. He regularly went on the tour to Jersey and played in South Africa and the Caribbean. If that was not enough he supported cricket weeks by either taking a side or joining in one. In particular, he will long be remembered at Shepherds Bush, Ealing, Old Actonians, South Hampstead, Richmond and Teddington.

His quality as a player was underlined by the representative honours he gained for the Association of Middlesex Cricket Clubs, The Middlesex County Cricket League and the Club Cricket Conference.

Perhaps the highlight was being chosen in 1979 to join the CCC Tour to Australia, New Zealand, Singapore & Hong Kong. His ability was such that he played on 10 occasions for the League between 1975 and 1979 and ended up with an outstanding average of 46 and a highest score of 93*.

Roger's life could not be defined by totals, averages, and indeed representative honours. His greatest quality was his ability to make friends wherever he went and his determination to ignore his handicap so that he could continue to lead as full life as possible. In his earlier days he was a regular visitor to the dogs at The White City; he played bridge; he was a football referee; he liked horse racing and enjoyed having a bet. His friendship with Terry Harris of Richmond was legendary and one of their capers was to run the book on the outcome of the League each year.

In order to maintain an active life it has to be remembered that it was due to his determination to do as much as he could but it also proved to be possible due the care and attention that he engendered from his friends and helpers. As a result he had a full life and appeared in any number of places and occasions. The Club has benefited enormously from Roger's time with us and he will be much missed.

GRAHAM P MILES

1930-2013

Graham played a significant role in the Club during the 50s and 60s. He was a correct and tenacious opening batsman, albeit with a curious stance. He was always immaculately turned out both on and off the field and was well known for his very dry sense of humour.

Graham joined in his late teens in 1949 and played for the both the cricket and football teams and later bowls. In his early period he was part of a very strong 3rd XI but eventually that group of players including his life-long friend and opening partner, Ken Kettle, and Mick Dyason moved into the 2nd XI where they proved to be a formidable side. Such was the standard of the Club in different circumstances Graham would have played a lot more 1st XI cricket. When the opportunity arose he gave a good account of himself. He played some 35 times for the 1st XI with a top score of 90 and an amazing average of 39. In the 2nd XI he compiled nearly 4,000 runs as indeed he had in the 3rd XI. He was 2nd XI captain in 1963 and 1964.

In addition to a full sporting career, which included a life-long support of Brentford F C, Graham ran his own family business and also played a full and dedicated role in Rotary, where he held a number of offices. If that was not enough, he took on the onerous position of Secretary to Brentham Club Ltd, a post he held for some 10 years.

Graham suffered a stroke in 2007 and his last years were spent in St David's Home.

JOHN A OVERY - VICE PRESIDENT **27/11/1937 – 10/10/2013**

His cricketing career was as a wicketkeeper and mainly with Dulwich between 1959 and 1971, where he quickly progressed from the 3rd XI to the 1st XI. He played over 400 games and remarkably achieved over 500 catches and stumpings. In addition, he was Sunday captain in 1967 as well as holding the posts of Match Secretary in 1964 and Treasurer in 1965.

John came to Brentham in the late 60s, initially playing on a Sunday. Due to the inevitable competition for the wicket-keeping spot he mainly played 2nd XI cricket but, nevertheless, appeared for our 1st XI on 132 occasions, 33 of which were in The League. He added another 168 victims to his tally including 38 stumpings, which tends to point towards the quality of a wicketkeeper. Batting was not one of his strengths but he would have been proud of his highest score of 40 not out.

He played a prominent role in the early days of The Thames Valley Gentlemen, where he was also Treasurer. Apart from his playing record he greatly assisted the corporate entertaining and, therefore, fund-raising via the running of the open top buses to the Derby. The proceeds were such that it made possible the entertaining of a series of Overseas Touring Sides and International Players.

Following his playing days John took up umpiring. He proved to be a very good one and this was reflected in his appointment in 1991 to officiate at the Middlesex Cup Final between Teddington and Ealing. It was a great shame that as a result of unseemly abuse on one occasion he decided to give it up as he found attitudes unacceptable.

John's son Graeme played for the club and was captain from 1991-1992 as also did John's grandson James. One of John's proudest moments was the day James became a Member at the MCC so that the family membership then covered 3 generations.

Football also was pursued avidly and John not surprisingly was a goalkeeper. He played for Brentham, Ealing Association, and Mead Vale.

In view of all these commitments it was a surprise, as John had not mentioned it, to learn that Masonry had also played a large part in his life, so much so that he had attained a senior position in the movement.

John could be described as committed and thorough with organisational ability, pride in his family and substantial sporting skills. He volunteered to take on the role of Brentham Treasurer in 2009 and was determined that he would fulfil his duties to the highest standards. Even when he was diagnosed with cancer he continued in his role through his illness and terms in hospital. He did not want to give up and was anxious as to whether that there would be a suitable alternative. We owe him our gratitude for not only carrying out his duties so well but also for the selfless example he displayed.

M W P (MICK) ANNAND
24/02/1940 – 02/06/2013

Michael will long be remembered by his team mates as the life and soul of the Club. His role in life was to lighten the situation and Ivor Chaplin figured largely in his playful approach to life. His antics were legion and too many to recount, although the speed of his driving is still etched in many memories. Despite his humour he approached his cricket with purpose. He was a slow bowler, who well into his career unusually converted from an off spinner to a leg break bowler.

Michael played through the XI's during the 60s and early 70s and represented the 1st XI on 175 occasions. He took 211 wickets at an average of 21. His outstanding performances were both against Wimbledon when he returned the figures of 6 for 53 in 1971 and 5 for 33 in 1972. In all he achieved a 5 wicket haul on 5 occasions.

His batting was best summarised by either "Did not Bat" or 0 not out. In fact, he had over 40 not outs, which must be a Club record. His highest score of 37, again not out, against his favourite opposition, Wimbledon, was an event about which he was most articulate, particularly as it more than doubled his career aggregate.

Brentham was dear to his heart and he served as Secretary in 1969 and 1970, Team Secretary in 1965 and was 3rd XI captain in 1964. He was also very keen on football and was a life-long supporter of Brentford FC. As a player, he was heavily involved in the early days of Mead Vale FC, (along with many Brentham CC colleagues) where as a full-back he 'specialised' in ensuring his clearances were always firmly struck!

Following on after his cricketing career Michael was encouraged to take up Bowls by his wife Jenny, a County player, although he never managed to beat her. He played at Leatherhead, Supreme Bowling, where he held the offices of Secretary, Captain and finally President, and Imber Court. He became a Director of King George Field Indoor Bowls Club and Team Manager of their Ladies National Team.

All Members and Guests of Brentham CC will:

- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person within the context of Cricket
- Treat everyone equally and not discriminate on the grounds of age, gender, disability, race, ethnic origin, nationality, colour, parental or marital status, religious belief, class or social background, sexual preference or political belief
- Not condone, or allow to go unchallenged, any form of discrimination if witnessed
- Display high standards of behaviour
- Promote the positive aspects of Cricket e.g. fair play
- Encourage all participants to learn the Laws and rules and play within them, respecting the decisions of match officials
- Actively discourage unfair play, rule violations and arguing with match officials
- Recognise good performance not just match results
- Place the well-being and safety of Young People above the development of performance
- Ensure that activities are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of the individual
- Respect Young People's opinions when making decisions about their participation in Cricket
- Not smoke, drink or use banned substances whilst actively working with Young People in the Club.
- Not provide Young People with alcohol when they are under the care of the Club
- Follow ECB guidelines set out in the "Safe Hands – Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children" and any other relevant guidelines issued
- Report any concerns in relation to a Young Person, following reporting procedures laid down by the ECB
- In addition to the above, all Club Officers and Appointed Volunteers will:
- Hold relevant qualifications and be covered by appropriate insurance

- Always work in an open environment (i.e. avoid private or unobserved situations and encourage an open environment)
- Inform Players and Parents of the requirements of Cricket
- Know and understand the ECB's 'Safe Hands – Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children'.
